Connect

Students discuss the following questions:

- What do you remember learning in the lesson about identity (or the previous lesson)? What does your partner remember?
- Do we only need to respect people who respect us?

Activate

Worksheet 1.7a: Respect crossword

- Students complete the crossword based on key words. If help is needed, give students key words to choose from. (Answers: Down 1. discrimination, 3. tolerance, 5. equality, 6. mutual, 7. dignity, 8. society, 9. democracy, 12. diversity; Across 2. respect, 4. prejudice, 10. integration, 11. law, 13. historical, 14. policy)
- **Extra support:** provide certain students with key words and a dictionary. Demonstrate the activity by completing the first two crossword entries (1 down and 2 across).

Demonstrate

Worksheet 1.7b: Fill the gaps

• Students fill in missing words on the worksheet. (Answers: 1. respect, 2. mutual, 3. tolerance, 4. prejudice, 5. dignity, 6. democracy, 7. society, 8. and 9. law/policy, 10. discrimination, 11. equality, 12. historical, 13. diversity, 14. integration)

Consolidate

- Class discussion: students discuss: When does the idea of mutual respect become complicated in a fair society? For example:
 - Should we respect a person's belief that nudity is acceptable in the workplace?
 - Should we respect a person's wish to murder relatives who don't follow a certain religion?
 - Should we respect a person's belief that she or he can drive safely at 200mph?
 - Should we respect a person's wish to get drunk while pregnant?

Extra challenge

Ask more able students: Can you give an example of when mutual respect has been missing between voters and politicians?

Use your school/college website: refer students to relevant policies (whole-organisation rules, antibullying statement, etc.).

Homework

Find an example of someone who has been prosecuted for online posts that show a lack of respect for other citizens.
